

A Professional Development Process for Senior Economic Developers October 14-17, 2024, Kauffman Conference Center, Kansas City, MO

- SITE SELECTION MONDAY featuring three Site Selection Guild members focused on challenges and opportunities in business and industry recruitment in these exciting times. From the May 2024 class, Site Selection Monday faculty were Mark Williams, President of Strategic Development Group; John Longshore, Newmark; and Gray Swoope, president of Vision First Advisors and former Secretary of Commerce for Florida and Mississippi.
- Fired Up, Burned Out or In-between Dr. Robert Prescott
 Economic developers face expected and unexpected stress that impacts their personal and professional lives. It's all around us, with expectations, successes, and disappointments.

 How we handle stress quite often determines our effectiveness and ripples throughout the organization.
- Talent at a Crossroads Across America Kate McEnroe
 Workforce challenges are now more complex than ever. Forty percent of U.S. working-age
 adults are on the sidelines, presenting challenges and opportunities to grow the workforce
 pipeline through targeted local skills-based training. This session examines pathways to
 grow a skilled workforce to fill the demand for new and existing businesses and strategies
 for moving those on the couch to productive careers.

- Effective Negotiation Strategies Dr. Rita Kosnik, Texas Christian University Negotiation is something that professional economic developers encounter daily. This interactive session examines negotiation techniques and strategies for project management, staff, community interaction, and everyday decisions.
- Managing Change in Turbulent Times Requires Disruptive Leadership
 Leaders can influence change for economic success, even in uncertain and turbulent times.
 This session explores the importance and inevitability of change and how professionals can channel change into positive action through disruptive leadership.
- Change the Way You Communicate: Why You Should, How You Can Author, Communications' Expert Ken Haseley
 Professionals who communicate effectively get others to listen to, understand, and act on what is said. Communicating effectively involves eliminating comfortable but outdated and self-defeating phrases, gestures, and bad slides. Ken's lessons apply to prospect visits, media interviews, and speeches.
- The Global Economy and its Impact on Economic Development Strategies Dr. Gary Wagner, economics professor at Louisiana State University at Lafayette, outlines the effects of the past two years on supply chains, the U.S. economy, and the impact of global events on everyday job creation. His sobering session will cause a hard look at what we can expect as we approach the 2024 elections.
- Breakout Sessions for Rural and Urban Cities
 Frank, open discussion on topics related to America's urban and rural communities. These breakout session topics are decided by the class and produce some of the most informative lessons of the week.
- Behavioral and Communication Attributes Applied to the Professional Economic Developer
 - This top-rated session reviews personal and professional communication by examining four individual speaking approaches: Analytical, Conceptual, Structural, and Social. Dr. Ed Nichols' session is always evaluated by the class as the most entertaining, informative, and applicable to the economic developers' war chest.
- HGTV's Home Town Takeover's Lessons that Apply Everywhere.
 Shellie Whitfield, Wetumpka's chamber director and star of HGTV's Home Town Takeover, outlines lessons that any city can apply based on the transformation in Wetumpka, Alabama.
